From our President John Eastman:

On Tuesday, December 7, 2010, Carlen Booth and I attended the third annual **Wreaths Across America** ceremony at the Ponaganset Middle School in North Scituate.

Upon our arrival we were met on the walkway to the school by a long line of students waving American flags and cheering us as we walked into the lobby. We were directed to a table where we found our nametags and because we were pre-registered as veterans, we were presented with special veteran's nametags.

Both Carlen and I remarked that we had never been thanked so profusely for our service before this day. Complete strangers who noticed our nametags immediately thanked us and made every effort to recognize us as veterans.

When the <u>Wreaths Across America</u> caravan arrived everyone went outside to witness the spectacle of 5 or 6 eighteen wheelers proceeded by 40 motorcycles with their Patriot Guard Riders and to cheer the drivers and the other members of the caravan into the building.

When we went up to the second floor auditorium/cafeteria space we were ushered to priority seating and as we sat down our names, along with the names of the rest of the veterans in the audience, were flashed on a big screen over the stage. The stage was filled with the middle school chorus and the middle school band and they put on a splendid performance.

The ceremony itself was not long due to time constraints for the caravan but it was very expressive and educational. The middle school children learn a great deal about service and patriotism during the school year. They have a chance to meet veterans in the classroom and to question them about their service. Accompanying the caravan this year was a group of gold-star mothers who were recognized on stage for their family's sacrifice.

I felt that the ceremony was very meaningful and I urge a greater participation by the Rhode Island Society of the Sons of the American Revolution next year. It is well worth it!

Also, from our President, please note that at the Annual Meeting a vote will be taken to change the by-laws as follows:

Present by-laws - as of 02/19/06

<u>ARTICLE V – FEES AND DUES</u>

SECTION 1. The application fee shall be \$15 in addition to that required by the National Society at the time of application and the annual dues of this State Society shall be \$20 in addition to that charged by the National Society.

Suggested change – as of 02/12/11

<u>ARTICLE V – FEES AND DUES</u>

<u>SECTION 1.</u> The application fee, <u>and the fee for supplemental applications</u>, shall be <u>an</u> <u>amount set by the Board of Managers and approved by a majority of the membership at</u> <u>the annual meeting of the organization</u> in addition to that required by the National Society at the time of application. The annual dues of this State Society shall be <u>an amount set by</u> <u>the Board of Managers and approved by a majority of the membership at the annual</u> <u>meeting of the organization</u> in addition to that charged by the National Society.

This by-law change will be set forth at the annual meeting (as required by ARTICLE XXII – AMENDMENTS, SECTION 1) as long as it has been announced to the general membership

at least ten days before the meeting. It will become effective only on approval of two-thirds of the members present.

For those of you that have often wondered about those Indians that took part in the Boston Tea Party, Benjamin L. Carp has written the "Defiance of the Patriots—The Boston Tea Party & the Making of America" published by Yale University Press. Here is a review from Amazon: "Carp masterfully tells the whole story of the Boston Tea Party. It was not just about "taxation without representation" and part of the linear progression from the French and Indian War to the Revolution. The tea in the harbor was a cog in the global empire's system of taxation and trade directed from London. The East India Company spanned the globe in its pursuit of profits- a veritable 18th century vampire squid. The sale of the tea would enhance their monopoly and the custom duties would pay the salary of the despised Governor of the Massachusetts colony. Interestingly, patriots in Philadelphia, New York and other cities had similar plans. But the always anxious Bostonians beat them to the punch. A great yarn."
